(DoD) What, if anything, has the DoD IG done in response to the U.S. Government Accountability Office’s (GAO) finding that the DoD IG “has not developed a policy specifically for investigations of sexual assault incidents,” nor is it “monitoring or evaluating the services’ investigations of sexual assault and the related training of investigators”? (GAO Report to the Subcommittee on Military Personnel, Committee on Armed Services, House of Representatives, Oversight and Better Collaboration Needed for Sexual Assault Investigations and Adjudications (June 2011), GAO-11-579, p.9.) If nothing has been done, please provide any and all reasons for not responding to this GAO finding.

DoD	<p>DoD OIG has developed policy in DoDI 5505.18, “Investigation of Adult Sexual Assault in the Department of Defense” which was published on January 25, 2013. In addition, the DoD OIG is working with the MCIOs to comply with the Fiscal Year (FY) 2013 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) requirement to develop a special victim’s capability to address sexual assaults, child abuse, and serious domestic violence allegations in the military services.</p> <p>On February 28, 2013, the DoD OIG published the “Evaluation of Military Criminal Investigative Organizations (MCIO) Sexual Assault Investigation Training (Report No. DoDIG-2013-043) which examined: the training each MCIO provides to its criminal investigators; how each MCIO ensures its training is effective; and how well the MCIOs share expertise and leverage resources. The “Evaluation of Military Criminal Investigative Organizations Sexual Assault Investigations” (Report No. DoDIG 2013-091) was been published on July 9, 2013.</p>
