T. Michael Andrews is the Managing Attorney for the D.C Crime Victims Resource Center (DCCVRC) and Assistant Professor at the University of Maryland University College in the Public Safety Department. As Managing Attorney, Andrews represent' s crime victim's pro bono in D.C. Federal and Superior Court focusing on the enforcement of the Crime Victim's Rights Act and the DC Crime Victim's Rights Law. Prior to the founding of the DCCVRC, Professor Andrews served with distinction at the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) focusing on the Department's drug interdiction efforts, border security and human trafficking. Prior to working at DHS, Professor Andrews was a Career Prosecutor in Tucson, Arizona where he served as an Assistant United States Attorney, Deputy County Attorney and Chief Tribal Prosecutor. As a prosecutor, Andrews litigated over 100 major felony jury trials, encompassing a wide variety of cases involving drug trafficking, gang, sexual offenders, domestic violence and capital murder. Mr. Andrews has also served as a Judge Pro-tem with the Pascua Yaqui Indian Tribe. Andrews has published several articles regarding drug policy, victim rights and human trafficking. His first book, "The Border Challenge: Insider's Guide of Stopping Drugs as America's Borders," was published in 2011 by University Press of America. Professor Andrews also sits on many nonprofit boards and commissions including the United States Sentencing Commission's Victim Advisory Group, The Calvary Women's Project and the SHADE Foundation. Professor Andrews is a graduate of Morgan State University where he graduated summa cum laude in Political Science and a MS from Salve Regina University. Andrews also holds a JD from Roger Williams University School of Law, and a LL.M from The George Washington University School of Law.
