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Purpose

To produce mid-level military justice supervisors (chiefs of justice, senior defense counsel, and deputy staff judge advocates) who can effectively advise convening authorities, manage military justice operations, and conduct complex case analysis.

Educational Objectives

Graduates will be able to -

- Conduct sophisticated analysis of a complex case.
- Provide oversight of the pretrial process including review and quality control of pretrial documents such as pleadings, court-martial convening orders, panel selection documents, and pretrial advice documents.
- Advise a convening authority on referral in a complex case.
- Implement and sustain office management systems.

Practicing Military Justice Deskbook (2013). Manual for Courts-Martial (2012).

Grading

Grades will be based on two written exercises and one briefing exercise. The written submissions will evaluate your understanding of pleadings and crimes under the UCMJ and court-marital convening orders. The briefing exercise will evaluate your ability to analyze a complex case and advise a convening authority on taking pretrial action. The evaluations in this block will be 50% of your overall final grade for Criminal Law.

Attendance

- READ: The student is expected to read and study the material listed in detail. You should be prepared to use that material in detail in class.
- STUDY: The student is expected to focus on this particular portion of the assignment and also reflect on the material and how it might be used to solve real-world problems in the JAGC. You should expect to use this material to think through and analyze problems / scenarios during class.
- FAMILIARIZE: The student should read the material for an overall understanding of the point of the material listed. You should be prepared to use overall concepts from the material in class, but you will not need detailed information from the material.
- COMPLETE: For exercises, study questions, and similar material that should be finished prior to class. You are expected to complete all portions of this work prior to class.
- BE PREPARED: You are expected to prepare as necessary for requirements that will be performed during class. The scope and method of preparation is up to you, so long as you meet the requirement during the class session.
